
Growth of PA Programs: Implications for the Profession

The growth has not been linear. The total number of programs in operation by 2016 is projected to be 231*, and by 2020 it will be 273!



Growth in Existing Programs

- ARC-PA reports that about 5
 programs each year request an
 increase in their class size.
- Average increase is about 25%.
- This adds about 50 students per year to the projected total graduates.



Total Graduates Per Year

- Current US graduating class: approx.
 8,000
- Plus growth of 50 per year from existing programs
- Plus the addition of new programs each year with an average class size of 42




Cumulative PA's in the Workforce

- Currently ~ 102,000 (NCCPA, Dec 31, 2014)
- Adding an increasing number each year (~ 10,000)
- Cumulative total by 2016 estimated to reach 140,000



Cumulative PA's






Job Market

- Estimated need provided by the Bureau of Labor Statistics (latest May, 2012)
 - 83,000 jobs in 2010, growing at a rate of 30% over ten years (2010-2020)
 - 103,000 total by 2018
 - Assume a 20% under-estimation on their part due to the Affordable Care Act....
 (they estimate their own error to be 1.6% for this data)



Job Market

- 106,000 available PA Jobs in 2018
- 140,000 cumulative PA's Produced




• 34,000 PA's Overproduced.....



Job Market

- 106,000 available PA Jobs in 2018
- 140,000 cumulative PA's Produced



34,000 PA's Overproduced.....

Effects:

- PA Salaries: decrease if supply > demand
- Applicant Pool: decreases if job market weakens



Solutions?

- Slow the growth of production
- Increase the job market beyond what the BLS is predicting
 - If we grow the job market by 10% per year rather than the 3% predicted by BLS (30% over ten years) we could meet this goal.
 - 10% yearly growth (or, doubling the number of PA jobs in a decade) would require considerable effort to promote the profession.
